The meeting was opened with acknowledging our guests and going over the four agreements.

A Cultural Highlight with the LHS Latin American Student Organization (LASO) students. This group started during the second semester last year. They celebrated Hispanic Heritage Month by connecting with Quail Run students, attending the Maya Exhibit at KC Union Station, celebrating the Day of the Dead with an exhibit and supporting an exchange student from Ecuador.

We are working hard to extend the Native American month. Everyone was invited to attend the Lawrence High-Shawnee Mission East game on December 16th where they will have Native American dancers performing.

We will be celebrating Martin Luther King with a ceremony at the Lied Center on January 19th. The students chose the theme: "Loves Illuminates Life!"

A video was shared with the group by Dr. Lewis on the Futures Planning Update. (See link above.)

We reviewed our previous data including attendance and behavior. There was a request to see demographics of this data to get a better understanding. (Please see attachment.)

Regarding Restorative Practices, the question was asked for Justice Matters if there is full representation at all three levels of schools that are trained in Tier II and Tier III interventions? No, we are not there yet. We are working hard to get this done, but it is not an overnight process. Oakland Public Schools is a national leader in Restorative Practices and is partnering with us. They have said the work is a ten year process. We are seeing positive outcomes already. Not every teacher needs to be trained in Tier II and Tier III. All teachers in a building are trained in Tier I and we are working very hard to get the additional training for our Student Services and Mental Health personnel, counselors and others that have the highest need.

Three middle school students from West Middle School came tonight to help us with our circles. Students leading the circles help students to engage more and also helps with building empathy. Secondary assistant principals met today and the message addressed was that we need to be more consistent with what we do and how we do it. This is hard work. Elementary is on the same track as secondary in this work. Our pilot for emotional social curriculum has been very positive. When the question comes up as to what we are doing, it's important to know that we are looking at the data and trying to work with different solutions like our emotional social curriculum. The equity dimension is implicit. The students that participate in the circles shared how they try to help other students, whether it is encouraging them to talk or telling them it is okay if they don't feel like talking. They try to help overcome the awkwardness. We broke into two circles to see what this is like in Restorative Practices. At the end, it was asked for one word to describe the circle to close the meeting.
